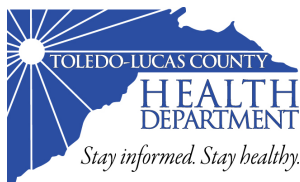

Purpose

While it may be common to think that removal of lead from paint and gasoline in the 1970s took care of lead health issues, the truth is that lead exposure is still a legitimate concern to this day. Children are still frequently exposed to lead from various sources including imported toys and candies, contaminated soils, and aging living structures within our communities. According to the Ohio Department of Health, there is an estimated 19,000 children with lead poisoning in the state of Ohio. Nearly half of those children are living in the six largest counties, Lucas County being among them. Perhaps the most troubling fact is that lead poisoning is completely preventable. With increased awareness, a nutritional diet, and proper home maintenance, many of these children would not have to suffer the irreversible damage caused by lead exposure. Increasing the testing of all at-risk children and eliminating points of exposure are just a few of the ways to combat the issue at the local level, but even these actions require a community effort.
