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## Message from the Health Commissioner

I am proud to be a part of this fantastic Lucas County community. I want to thank everyone who lives, learns, works, or plays here for all their efforts to stay informed and stay healthy. The public health landscape is ever-changing and this community has successfully navigated several major public health issues in the past year, relying on the Health Department's guidance, leadership, and dynamic response to protect the health of Lucas County residents.

One of the primary roles for any health department is to educate and inform their community about public health issues that may arise and affect our way of life. The Toledo-Lucas County Health Department (TLCHD) has made strides in honing our ability to deliver health information in ways that not only inform and educate but also work to alleviate public concerns. This was demonstrated during the Hepatitis A outbreak in 2019, where we found ourselves caught between outbreaks in both Southeast Michigan and Southern Ohio. TLCHD staff proactively established a vaccination program for those most at risk for contracting the Hepatitis A virus, while educating and informing our constituents on the signs, symptoms, and causes of this disease. Our response also included close collaboration with private industry to limit their liabilities associated with this public health event and ensure their customers were protected.

While the Hepatitis A outbreak was a unique public health event, TLCHD also successfully addressed the other issues that rose to public health significance in the past year. Regular concerns like the annual flu season are as crucial to the health of our community as occasional outbreaks.

In 2019, 115 individuals were hospitalized for the flu, and many others weathered sickness from the virus. Compared to the 2017-2018 season, where 343 individuals were hospitalized and the 2016-2017 season, where 50 individuals were hospitalized, it is clear how vital a reliable communication pathway is to help our community navigate these yearly fluctuations in preventing and reducing the severity and spread of influenza. The health department has honed its communication pathway for both routine and emergency communications, used for the most serious public health events through to our day to day program updates.

No matter how tried and true a communication process, there is always room for improvement. While TLCHD does a great job communicating about emergent public health issues and the diseases our community faces, TLCHD can improve how we inform our community on all we offer to promote the safety of our citizens as well as improved health and wellness.

We look forward to 2020's possibilities with a vision. To spread the word about public health further, what it is, what it means for our future, and how it protects our community through the prevention and timely response to issues that arise. It is my hope that you will have a better understanding of public health and TLCHD's programs. I wish you the very best 2020 in all things and especially in health.





### Restrictions on the Sale of Vapor Products and Electronic Smoking Devices

The Tobacco Prevention Program partnered with Toledo City Council and local vape shop owners to address the public health epidemic of vaping, focused on limiting the availability of vape products to youth. On Tuesday, December 10, 2019, the City of Toledo passed Ordinance 569-19, under the Toledo Municipal Code, enacted new Section 537.28 entitled "Restrictions on the Sale of Vapor Products and Electronic Smoking Devices." The ordinance states that only Retail Vapor Product Specialty Businesses (vape shops) can sell flavored vapor products or flavored electronic smoking devices. Pre-filled manufactured flavored vapor cartridges aren't allowed to be sold in the City of Toledo. Toledo is the first city in Ohio to put restrictions on the sale of vaping products.
