One of the most significant changes has been the restructuring of TLCHD's leadership. It has been my honor and privilege to be chosen to serve as your Health Commissioner this past June. From my first day on the job it has been an eventful, fast-paced, and rewarding journey. My vision for the future is to continue driving the transformation of our department into a more user friendly, results driven, and respected health department. As we work to enhance our culture and improve on the delivery of our services, the Health Department's process of change will take time and patience to address the barriers before us, to build on our successes, and to instill our vision for a healthier community. I know that in time our dedicated staff will build this department into what our community deserves.

The transformation of the Health Department will be no easy task, but as with any worthwhile endeavor, it will enrich the public's health. The changes already undertaken have noticeably moved our leadership structure from a rigidly top-down style to a more flexible structure that trusts our supervisors and staff to lead the department through an ever-better delivery of public health to Lucas County. This change is small on the surface but it is a move in the right direction. There is much more work ahead in our transformation process, and I will continue this drive forward until only the best possible services are provided to our community. In this regard, I feel that Lucas County deserves even better than best, and will continually promote positive change and improvement while keeping our community informed every step of the way.

One issue I take no pleasure in mentioning is our county's ranking for Health Outcomes. In 2016, Lucas County was ranked at a dismal 73rd of 88 counties. This is unacceptable and must be addressed. While it would take countless pages to sum up my thoughts and concerns regarding this ranking, I truly feel the only way to address this terrible fact is through action. This call to action to create better outcomes for our community involves not only the Toledo-Lucas County Health Department, but also the businesses, elected officials, health care personnel, and all other individuals that live, work and play in Lucas County. The reasons we need a cohesive collaborative effort are numerous as no single entity can solve all of our health issues alone in Lucas County. It will take coordinated leadership to improve the health and well-being of all people in Lucas County through stronger, all-encompassing partnerships. There is so much good work being done by so many outstanding agencies and organizations, that to better our county's health, we need only make sure we are all aligned in the same direction.

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In 2016 the Health Department fundamentally changed its operating principles from opaque government entity to an agency fostering open assistance, guidance, and leadership in effort to promote successful partnerships that allow ideas to bloom into action. The Health Department has already taken steps to utilize these principles on issues that plague our community such as obesity, infant mortality, and opiate use, among others. However, the department cannot simply remain satisfied with the success it has achieved so far, but needs to ensure a steady course for itself and the community is both set and followed. Establishing this course began in 2016 through the development of a new strategic plan for the health department. This plan not only provides a direction for our agency and the community, but also brings attention to the issues that impact the 73rd ranking we hold. More about this plan will be made public once it is completed in early 2017.

In closing, 2016 should be remembered as the Year of Change for the Health Department. I view our progress not simply as change for change's sake, but as ever progressive improvement to the health and well-being of our community. I am positive that 2017 will see continued positive transformation as we move into a Year of Action at the Health Department.

## Community Services Response and Preparedness

#### **Communicable Disease**

In 2016, the division of Community Services, Response and Preparedness Division (CSRP) continued to work on the supplement to its PHEP grant. This supplement aimed to increase local and state coordination and preparedness planning with regard to the concerns surrounding Ebola Virus Disease (EVD) and other special pathogens.

The CSRP division continued to collaborate with 17 other counties in the Northwest Ohio region to develop the Northwest Ohio Ebola and Other Special Pathogens Concept of Operations Plan. This plan was acknowledged by all 18 health commissioners in Northwest Ohio and accepted by the Ohio Department of Health in October 2016. This plan will be reviewed annually to ensure it is updated to the latest information.

The TLCHD Disaster Response Team is comprised of public health employees from across all divisions of the department to assist in immediate disaster response and preparedness. In 2016, the response team was able to engage with different partners from across Toledo and Lucas County including the United States Coast Guard, Toledo Police, Lucas County Emergency Management, and ProMedica Toledo Hospital. The disaster response team is also trained on incident command structure and personal protective equipment to properly respond to any public health emergency in Lucas County.






